- **Coinflip:** A direct PvP (Player vs. Player) game where 2 users wager skins of approximately equivalent worth. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the whole pot (minus a site commission, called the "rake").
- **Jackpot:** Multiple gamers pool their skins into a single pot. The higher the worth of a player's skin relative to the total pot, the higher their percentage chance of winning the entire swimming pool.
- **Case Opening:** Simulated versions of Valve's in-game case openings, often featuring personalized odds and higher-tier reward pools created by the website operators.

Comparing Types of CS: GO Gambling Platforms

Not all platforms run the same method. The industry typically classifies sites into 3 distinct models based on how they deal with deals.

3. Fair Play and "Provably Fair" Systems

Reputable sites utilize cryptographic algorithms referred to as "Provably Fair" systems.
