Moderate (House edge constructed into the green tile) **Coinflip** A direct 1v1 PvP game where 2 players wager equivalent skin worths. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the entire pot (minus a little website commission). Low-to-Moderate (50/50 odds minus platform rake) **Jackpot/ Pot** Multiple gamers deposit skins into a common swimming pool. Each skin contributes to the gamer's "ticket" share. A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the whole pot. High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Imitates the official Valve case openings, typically with higher or tailored chances and distinct prize pools. High (Typically undesirable go back to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or money on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based upon live odds. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate risk)
