3. The Reverse Martingale (Paroli)

- **How it works:** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, riding hot streaks while keeping losses minimal during cold streaks.
- **Risk Level:** Moderate. Needs discipline to walk away after a few successive wins.
