2. Operation Bravo Case

Considered by numerous to be the ultimate collector's item, the Operation Bravo Case was launched in September 2013. It features iconic skins like the AK-47|Fire Serpent and the AWP|Graphite. Since it required an Operation Bravo pass to drop regularly throughout its time, the distributing supply is incredibly low.

3. CS: GO Weapon Case (Series 1, 2, and 3)

These are the grandfathers of all weapon cases. Launched shortly after the game's launch in late 2013 and early 2014, these cases introduced the original weapon surfaces. Opening one of these today is considered a high-stakes gamble, as a single case can cost hundreds of dollars simply to acquire.
