

How to feed pregnant mares well

Expecting mares have different needs throughout **gestation**, and the best feeding plan should support mare health without pushing unnecessary weight gain. The goal is a **balanced feeding program** that delivers **sufficient energy**, **good protein**, and the appropriate **micronutrients** for both the mare and the developing foal.
