

Garage doors are substantial, complicated systems that combine springs, cables, rollers, tracks, panels, sensors, and an electric opener. A small fault can rapidly turn into a security problem, keep you from exiting your home, or create a major injury risk. A door stuck halfway should not be forced with the opener or lifted by multiple people. Stop using the system and schedule an inspection, particularly if the panels are crooked or the cables appear slack.

When Is a Broken Garage Door Spring Be Dangerous?

A broken garage door spring is dangerous because springs store substantial energy. A torsion spring is mounted above the door and turns as the door moves. An extension spring is positioned along the horizontal tracks and stretches during operation. Both types can cause severe injury if they release suddenly or are handled with improper tools.

Signs of a spring failure include a loud bang, a visibly separated spring, a door that feels unusually heavy, cables that have come off the drums, or an opener that runs while the door remains on the floor. Do not remove spring hardware, insert tools into winding cones, or attempt to lift a heavy door manually unless a qualified professional has made it safe.

Garage door spring replacement usually includes inspection of the cables, drums, bearings, rollers, and mounting hardware. A technician should select the correct spring based on the door's weight and dimensions rather than simply installing a spring that looks similar.
