Wear Condition Drift Range Description **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Pristine condition with practically no scratches or use. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Small imperfections, often visible just upon close assessment. **Field-Tested (FEET)** 0.15-- 0.38 Noticeable wear and scratches, but the art work stays mostly intact. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Considerable wear, fading colors, and heavy scratching. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Extremely used, sometimes changing the graphic entirely. (*Note: Some skins look distinctively cool in BS, referred to as "Blackscars"*).

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™**: Items with this innovation feature an orange LED counter that tracks the number of confirmed eliminates made with that specific weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages**: These are dropped during official Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors) and function gold stickers representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve arranges CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how frequently they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
4. **Restricted (Purple):** Often forms the base components for trade-ups.
5. **Categorized (Pink):** Highly detailed, desirable mid-tier skins.
6. **Covert (Red):** The greatest standard rarity discovered in cases, including the most intricate styles.
7. **Unique/ Special (Gold):** Knives and Gloves-- the crown jewels of any CS2 inventory.
