3. The Low Multiplier Auto-Cashout

- **How it works:** Players set an automated cash-out at a very low multiplier, such as 1.05 x to 1.10 x.
- **The Catch:** While you will win the large majority of rounds, a single unanticipated 1.00 x crash (which happens occasionally) will eliminate lots of small wins quickly.
