Is a 20-Yard Dumpster Too Big for a Cleanout?

- Distribute the dumpster's weight over a larger area to avoid cracked concrete or asphalt indentations
- Reduce scuffing, scratching, or accidental gouges when bins are rolled or moved into place
- Help preserve expensive driveway surfaces for the long term

Many local dumpster providers include hardwood driveway protection in their service, while some national brokers may not guarantee it or may charge extra fees for this service. This difference often factors into overall satisfaction and property care.

Flat-Rate Pricing and Fee Transparency
