This single upgrade triggered an enormous shockwave in the trading community, permanently separating "investable skins" from "practical keys."

Kinds of Keys in Counter-Strike

Not all secrets are developed equal. Throughout the years, Valve presented several variations of keys tied to specific collections or events.

1. Requirement Case Keys

Bought directly from the in-game shop for £ 2.50. These can open the vast bulk of standard weapon cases currently dropping in the game.



2. Operation Keys

Throughout specific operations (like Operation Hydra, Breakout, or Wildfire), Valve launched operation-specific cases along with devoted operation secrets. As soon as the operation ended, these keys usually maintained their functionality for their particular cases, ending up being collector's products.

3. Esport Keys

Presented early in CS: GO's life-span to help fund prize swimming pools for expert competitions, Esport keys [website](#) opened Esport-specific green, blue, and red cases. These are remarkably uncommon today.

The Odds: What Are You Paying For?

Valve has never ever formally released specific algorithmic drop rates for every single single wear condition, however community-driven information collected from opening millions of cases has actually painted a really precise picture.
