- **The Moonshot (High Multiplier Chase)**

- *How it works:* Placing little bets and holding out for enormous multipliers (50x, 100x, or more).
- *Pros:* Extremely high payouts for an extremely little initial risk.
- *Cons:* Statistically uncommon events; the probability of losing the stake is extremely high.
