

Brockport, NY Climate Overview

Brockport, NY is situated in **Monroe County** and part of the larger **Rochester, NY** metro area. Its local **seasonal climate** mirrors inland upstate New York conditions with strong regional influence from **Lake Ontario**, especially in terms of **lake effect snow**, wind, and rapid shifts in **weather conditions**. Brockport is west of downtown Rochester, close enough to share many of the same **weather patterns**, but local exposure can still create a noticeable **microclimate**.

The area has a **humid continental climate**, which means residents and visitors experience four distinct seasons with cold winters, warm summers, and transitional spring and fall periods that can change quickly. 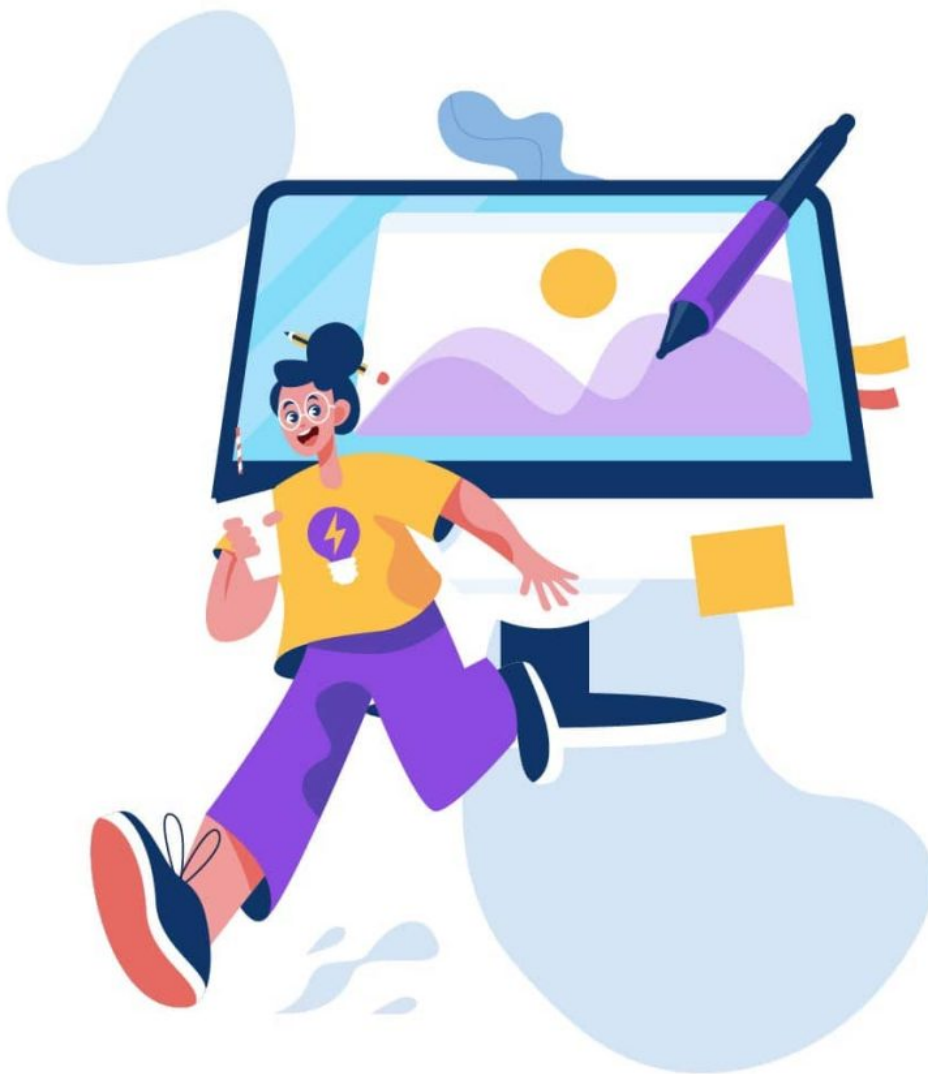

Winter

Spring
